After Reading:

Look through the book one more time and try acting out some of the rhymes with your child. You pick one to show him/her what to do. Then let your child pick one that they like and act it out. This could be fun activity for a rainy day. When you are acting the rhyme out be sure to emphasize those rhyming words again and again.

Related Reading:

Ask your local librarian for some more books that have rhyming in them. Ask about books of silly poems such as Shel Silverstein has written.

Before Reading:

Let your child explore the book. Let them discover that it has two front covers. One cover says My Two Hands My Two Feet and the other says My Two Feet My Two Hands. Let your child explore the book from both ends. See if they can figure out why the title is different on the two sides of the book.

During Reading:

The book is a series of rhymes about hands and feet. When reading the rhyme emphasize with your voice the rhyming words, such as “dance and prance” in the first rhyme on the feet end of the book. Read the rhymes as many times as your child wants to hear them.
